EMPE, Ariz. – Utah's football team elevated a brilliant season in Saturday night's Fiesta Bowl to lofty levels of the legendary. The Utes punctuated it in the best possible manner. With perfection.

A 35-7 win over Pittsburgh in front of a sellout crowd at Sun Devil Stadium and a national television audience left Utah with a 12-0 record and little else to prove. Over the past two seasons, the Utes are 22-2.

Utah scored 14 points in the first half, then scored 21 more in the third quarter en route to the final margin.

The Utes also dominated in the seats, where the crowd of 73,519 was bolstered by an estimated 50,000 Utah fans.

Rain, flash floods, earthquakes add to misery in Southeast Asia

BANDA ACEH, Indonesia — After the devastation wreaked by the seas, a deluge from the skies deepened the misery for tsunami-stricken areas Saturday, triggering flash floods in Sri Lanka that sent evacuees fleeing and increasing the threat of deadly disease. The confirmed death toll from the quake and tsunamis that hit a week ago Sunday passed 123,000, and the United Nations has said the estimated number was approaching

150,000. A 5.9 quake rocked Sumatra
