



'Salamander' Document

Letter Was Only One Of Hofmann's Finds

Mark Hofmann, a dealer in historical Mormon documents who shot himself after making significant financial news Wednesday when he was critically injured in a bomb blast.

Friends said Mr. Hofmann changed telephone numbers frequently, contacted those who called him rather than answering the phone, and disappeared from public view shortly before that connection led to speculations for discoveries.

The so-called "white salamander letter," written by early Mormon convert Martin Harris, was one such find.

Members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints believe an original copy of the Book of Mormon, South to golden plates he later translated into the Book of Mormon. In the 1830 letter, Martin Harris described

an old spirit that transformed itself into a white salamander and initially prevented the Mormon prophet from reading the plates.

Mr. Hofmann's business associate, Lynn Jacobs, discovered the letter. Mr. Hofmann sold it to Steven Christensen for \$40,000. Mr. Christensen was killed in a Tuesday morning bomb blast hours before Gary Sheets' wife, Cheryl Willoughby, found out she initially believed the bombings could have been connected to financial problems of a company Messers Sheets and Christensen had been involved in.

Historians seem to be divided on whether events linking Mr. Hofmann to the letterings will require scholars to re-examine the validity of documents he had sold to private collectors and the Mormon church.

Mr. Hofmann, 29 or 30, described himself as an eighth-generation Mormon who had served a church mission in Scotland, England, a collector of historical documents and a wheelwright.

"When I was a kid I collected coins," Mr. Hofmann said in a 1982 interview.

Israel: Tapes Prove Abbas Knew of Hijackers' Plans

Israel released transcripts it said proved PLO official Mohammed Arafat knew in advance the names and plans of the hijackers of an Italian cruise ship. An Italian prosecutor said he had solved the murder of an American passenger killed aboard the Achille Lauro.

Prosecutor Dovore Farki told a news conference after the ship docked Thursday at its home port in Haifa that he had learned the killing of the American in all the details. But he declined to say who pulled the trigger, killing Leon Klinghoffer of New York City.

Israel's military intelligence chief announced on national television Wednesday night that it had learned the details of Klinghoffer's death.

Saying it was the youngest of the four Palestinian hijackers who fired two shots into the 80-year-old invalid.

Authorities have said the hijackers were traveling on false documents, and have not identified them. But Israeli officials have said the four are Halim Abu-Shanab, 21; Abdul Alif Ibrahim, 20; Majid Yusef Al-Mutky, 23; and Hammam Ali Abdal-lah, 21.

Israel said it monitored an Oct. 9 conversation between the hijackers and Abu-Shanab, a member of the PLO's military wing. In the transcript released Wednesday, Abu-Shanab is heard as telling the hijackers not to harm the passengers and to explain to them "our objective."

Republicans Withdraw From Coalition; Italy's Government May Come Down

ROME (AP) — Defense Minister Giovanni Spadolini's Republican Party pulled out of the governing coalition Wednesday in an attempt to avert a no-confidence vote in Parliament by a tribe of PLI official senators.

Spadolini said he expected that action would force the government to resign. He said he would support Craxi and he would not quit without a vote of confidence in Parliament.

Craxi said he will take the government's case to Parliament on Thursday.

Acknowledging he was going to the presidential palace to hand in his resignation and end the 26-month-old government, Craxi snapped, "Why should I go to the Quirinale? Tomorrow I will go to Parliament."

In a statement adopted by the par-

tliamentary committee, the Republicans avowed the government of failing to consult coalition partners on "major subjects of the fight against terrorism and fundamental political interests involving foreign policy issues."

It said the party's "paramount task is to safeguard indispensable interests for the good of the repub-

lican executive committee. The Republicans issued a warrant for his arrest, charging him with piracy and hostage-taking.

Arafat was accused of the Egyptian plane hijacking that took place last week in U.S. territorial waters near the Italian island of Sicily.

Mark Hofmann, virtually injured in a car explosion Wednesday afternoon, has been identified as the prime suspect in bombings that killed two people Tuesday.

We've found enough evidence that federal agent Gary Miller is going to the U.S. Attorney's Office to file charges," Gary feels in his gut that we have more than enough [to charge Mr. Hofmann]," Salt Lake City police Chief Bud Willoughby said late Wednesday.

Mark, a resident agent in charge of the Salt Lake office of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, said he expects to seek charges Thursday morning for violations of federal explosives and firearms laws.

"We're not saying the investigation is concluded. We know who the players are and other charges will be filed other than Mr. Hofmann," added Chief Willoughby.

"We're looking for a revenge motive right now," said Mr. Miller.

Chief Willoughby said reports of recent financial transactions of Mr. Hofmann's involving Mormon de-

ments and statements from witnesses indicate that Hofmann could very well have suffered a huge financial loss."

Mr. Miller said as many as three more people may have been targeted for murder and he has narrowed out the possibility of "co-conspirators" in the murders. The federal agent declined to elaborate.

Mr. Hofmann, 29 or 30, a dealer of historic Mormon documents, sold the so-called "white salamander" letter to Steven F. Christensen, 21, who was killed in a Tuesday morning explosion at his office at the Judge Building, 8 Broadway (900 South).

Killed in a separate blast Tuesday at her Holiday Inn was Kathleen Sheets, 50, the wife of Gary Sheets. Mr. Sheets was a business associate of Mr. Christensen. Mr. Metcalf, whose home was searched Wednes-

day, said Mr. Sheets helped finance a \$250,000 study to determine whether the salamander letter was authentic.

Police said Mr. Hofmann was injured Wednesday when a car in his garage detonated at 2:40 p.m. The car was parked on the north side of 200 North about 75 feet west of Main Street just north of the Desert Gymnasium, 161 N. Main.

Mr. Hofmann was listed in critical but stable condition late Wednesday at LDS Hospital, where he is being held under guard.

Mr. Hofmann, said Chief Willoughby, was seen walking in his car carrying a package just before the explosion occurred. Another witness said he saw Mr. Hofmann leave his car earlier carrying a briefcase.

The police chief said his officers received a call Wednesday afternoon from a man who said "I know I am the next victim. You've got the help me." That unidentified man lived off worked only a block away from where the explosion occurred.

The decision to charge Mr. Hofmann came late Wednesday after police obtained warrants and searched both his home, located at 2219 Marie Circle (3140 South) and the wreckage of his car.

These warrants were apparently based on Reporters' 200 North including lengths of pipe, a pair of gloves and a felt-tipped pen. Chief Willoughby said "incriminating evidence" and numerous valuable water- and fire-damaged documents were found in the car, and two white garbage bags full of evidence — one containing his related documents — were taken from Mr. Hofmann's home. Chief Willoughby said.
